Our washroom facilities have been upgraded and redecorated for the convenience of staff and visitors.

We're Out to Raise Money!

It's no secret that we will have to move the Museum in less than two years so now is the time to start raising the funds we'll need to secure a new, and larger premises to house the Museum's collection. The present building is slated to be torn down and the property redeveloped in 2014.

Currently, the Museum is only able to display a fraction of its collection due to space considerations so a much larger building will be sought — ideally still in the heart of Port Hope, close to the retail area with its shops and restaurants.

Port Hope relies on its tourist business and the Museum is one of its draws. That said, a bigger, better museum, in a climate controlled building, has the advantage of being open year round thus drawing visitors to Port Hope all through the seasons. We think there is a tremendous opportunity here for Port Hope certainly, but for all of the region.

We have been actively fundraising for the past several months, and along with that, we have been raising local awareness of the Museum and the opportunity it provides.

The results so far have been very encouraging and we have been in the news constantly.

Funds raised so far have allowed us to complete some much needed upgrades to the present facility, purchase a new computer and create new marketing materials, including a new brochure, post cards and a beautiful new poster.

We've been getting a lot of support from businesses in the area. These include Wal Mart, Giant Tiger, McDonalds, Rona, Home Depot, Cameco Corporation and the LCBO.

New Additions to the CFFM Artifact Collection:

urator, John Downs has been busy acquiring new items for the Museum's ever-growing collection of Cana-

dian Firefighting artifacts.

Early in the year, he was able to secure one of the earliest cast iron fire hydrants made in Canada. This was found sitting in a garden in the Kitchener area where it had been since being removed from



service some years back. Dating from the mid 1880's, this hydrant has now been refurbished and joins the Museum's hydrant collection—likely the largest of its kind in Canada.

In this Diamond Jubilee year of the reign of Queen Elizabeth II, it's almost ironic that we've recently acquired a period framed photo of the Port Hope Fire Brigade taken in front of the Port Hope Fire Hall to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1895.

And speaking of Port Hope, John was also lucky to find a vintage Port Hope Fire Chief badge on ebay. It has now been returned to Canada and is on display with several other badges newly acquired, including several from St. John, New Brunswick.

There are always new (old) items arriving, these include a restored fire cart, circa 1900; a collection of fire department shoulder patches to add to our own collection; and much more!

The commissioned photographer, Jeremy Burgin to come in and photograph bits and pieces all over the Museum.


