We're going NATIONAL!

By now, it's no secret that we want to make CFFM Canada's NATIONAL Firefighting Museum and lately we've been getting closer to making this a reality.

While nearly every municipal fire department has a few artifacts of their past history, some have developed more extensive collections into actual fire museums. In other areas groups of enthusiasts, outside of the fire departments, have gathered private collections of fire equipment sufficient to open independent fire museums.

There are "dozens" of fire fighting museums and we've contacted 25 of them. Out of those we contacted, 24 have replied and 23 of them were positive!

This is important for CFFM as we are seeking the Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs endorsement, and as a condition, they've asked us to seek consensus with other museums. Now that the results are in, we await the CAFC decision.

But that's not all! We are currently in the midst of creating a cross Canada committee of advisors people from every province and territory who represent firefighters, equipment manufacturers, insurers and other fire fighting related concerns. With their advice and help we will be able to develop a collection that truly tells the story of fire fighting in every area of the country with representative artifacts and displays that are appropriate.

We look forward to being able to publish our list of advisors in the near future.
